PUPIL PREMIUM STRATEGY ALLOCATION OF FUNDING 2017-2018

Pupil Premium

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. During the academic year of 2012- 13, the criteria for eligibility expanded to include all children who had been eligible for FSMs in the previous six years.

The money is allocated to initiatives to ensure pupils reach their full potential, academically, physically and socially. This strategy is shared and discussed with the Governing Board and will be reviewed in September 2018.

<p>Analysis of whole school and individual pupil's data has shown some common factors that we have identified as barriers preventing some pupils from making better progress. We have also identified other areas of focus for PPG children of which this strategy aims to address across this academic year.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• At St Marys a high proportion (34%) of our PPG pupils have SEND and we aim to further narrow the gap between them and their peers nationally by	

accelerating individuals' progress from their starting points. We recognise this is a challenge but endeavour to close the gap, even if slowly, where possible.

- We know that some parents find engaging with school or services that can support them a challenge for a number of reasons. We have identified this in 25 % of our PPG families. Because of these findings, we would like to focus on strategies to engage them in some of the opportunities that school provides to improve their own knowledge, skills and understanding. We will be targeting hard to reach families for workshops etc. Our aim is that this would reflect on their children's academic ability and / or wellbeing.

In **2017 - 18** the school received £86,960 of Pupil Premium funding.
